

'The South Kensington Museum has agreed, on Mr Philip Burne-Jones's suggestion, to accept the engraved coppers of engravings, which otherwise by the practice of members of the Printsellers! Association, would be doomed to destruction as a sacrifice to the buying public. The arrangement is a good one only if the plates themselves are worthy of preservation on grounds either of artistic merit or of technical value and instruction. A less admirable concession has been made by the Print Room of the British Museum in accepting rolls of "animated photographs" of scenes and events. It appears to us that these have little in common with the purposes for which the British Museum was founded, and that a fitter place would be, say, the Record Office!
